Dear Parents,

In March, KIK classes focused on **Plants**. We explored fruits, vegetables, flowers and the uses of plants by learning how to plant and take care of them, the different parts of the plant as well as through creating beautiful artworks.

We also tried to connect all of our learning areas to plants for example counting how many seeds we planted, how tall or short each plant has grown, how many days it took to grow, what colors, shapes we could see and creating patterns with fruits/vegetables.

Students shared responsibilities of looking after plants, cleaned up messes and worked together cooperating with each other. We explored stories such as The Enormous Turnip, The Giving Tree and followed The Tiny Seed by Eric Carle to explore how a seed grows into a plant.

Our youngest, K1 students adjusted to the everyday routine of life at school fast. They have been excited to learn about farm, jungle and ocean animals and enjoyed exploring phonics with the Letter land characters Sammy Snake, Annie Apple and their friends.
